

Ugotta Regatta 2017 REVIEW

he 57th Annual Regatta was three days of ultimate sailing weather. Sailors had great wind, blue skies and warm temperatures for every day of racing. The LTYC Ugotta Regatta brought 83 competitors from all over the country delivering a spectacular sight to beautiful Little Traverse Bay.

The 2017 Ugotta Regatta registration hit the maximum boats on June 2nd, almost two months before the event, proving Little Traverse Bay is one of the best racing venues in the Midwest. The fleet ranged in length from 74 feet to 23 feet creating some of the most spectacular viewing from all over the bay.

Friday was One Design racing for the Alerion 28, Beneteau First 36.7, C & C 30, J/70, J/105 and ORR A Fleets. This was the largest number of One Design fleets to start for LTYC Ugotta Regatta, creating new challenges for the Race Committee. Each fleet racing windward/leeward races created a lot of action at the starting line.

Saturday and Sunday courses, different versions of the classic Tour of the Bay for each fleet, brought out 83 boats, all competing for the first place in their respective classes. For full results visit this link: https://yachtscoring.com/event_results_

nother great season of Club racing is behind us and we are in the planning and preparation process for 2018.

I personally enjoyed sailing Tuesday evenings aboard Rich Lehmann's J/70 "Wind Czar." As I reflect back on Tuesday nights, I can't remember a more perfect summer. I have been sailing competitively in

the Tuesday evening "beer can series" for 33 years on a variety of boats, and I can't remember a better year of weather, wind and competition.

The trend of one-design racing is certainly apparent on Little Traverse Bay. 95% of the boats competing on Tuesday evenings were either J/70s or Alerion 28s. Two strong onedesign fleets that continue to grow and flourish, and for good reasons.

The J/70 is the fastest growing one-design sailboat in the world! Our own Fleet #25 lead by Fleet Captain and J/70 owner Polk Wagner has blossomed into 12 regular fleet members and we are expecting a couple more to join next season. These sporty little speedsters are easy to own, easy to maintain, and can be rigged and launched by their owners. An affordable way to get you and your family out on the water. Another bonus with these boats is the ability to trailer to regattas and campaign during the winter months. We have several members that travel and compete with large fleets in St. Petersburg, Miami, Charleston, and Annapolis, just to name a few.

J/70s raced Tuesdays and Saturdays all season, and had a Championship weekend in August. A new perpetual trophy was procured for the Championships and was presented to Scott Sellers and the crew aboard "Tres Burritos". We had 20 J/70s competing in the Regatta and expect to grow that number in the future. I got to share in a victory aboard the hometown boat "Wind Czar" which was definitely one of the highlights to my summer.

The new windward-leeward racing format using a set X-mark was well received, enjoyed by all and provided tighter racing amongst the fleet. It gave boats more opportunity to pass and awarded tactics and crew work around the corners.

The Alerion 28 fleet is also showing strong participation and growth. Last I counted, we have 18 Alerion 28s on Little Traverse Bay with a dozen or so competing regularly. She is known as the "prettiest girl at the dance." Classic lines, proper overhang and very elegant from the waterline up, but she sports a modern underbody and is a real thoroughbred from the waterline down. These boats are designed to be sailed on your own terms and can be easily single-handed or raced with minimal crew. Bud Siudara has just stepped down as our Alerion Fleet Captain and we thank him for his passion and his time. We had good participation on Tuesday nights during the summer season, four or five came out on Saturdays and there were seven entries in the Ugotta Regatta. The Alerion 28s also competed in a Championship Series in August.

The J/105 Fleet enjoyed Sunday one-design racing which Fleet Captain Jay VanderWall reported as being great for the Fleet. Ugotta Regatta participation was good with a five-boat fleet enabling one design racing. For next year, the J/105s want to continue the Sunday racing as a tool for building readiness for the 2018 North Americans which will be hosted by LTYC during Regatta week. Preparations and planning for the North Americans are underway.

NM Fleet Captain Bill Brown has been thinking about an NM sail day. Something sponsored by LTYC, but open to all NMs. "More of an exhibition, not a competition. Maybe a fun race of some type but mainly an event to encourage participation and get all the boats out on the water together." The classic NM is alive and well with weekend series throughout the Summer. This boat is so iconic to Harbor Springs and it's great to see these boats still competing on Little Traverse Bay.

The Women's Regatta was rescheduled due to weather. Great racing was reported with both the Alerion and 420 Fleets. The racing was tight and winner of the Alerion Fleet was decided in a tie-breaker. Congratulations to the winners of this event and congratulations to Meredith Moran, the recipient of the Diane Nilstoft Memorial Scholarship.

We had 6 boats compete in the annual Beaver Island Race. To help increase participation, some things to consider in the future with this race might be to include our largest fleets of J/70s and Alerion 28s. This would also be a good opportunity to include members with powerboats or cruising sailboats that just want to cruise to the Island. Any suggestions or input to grow the Beaver Island event would be considered and appreciated.

LTYC contracted Dan Thompson to be the Sailing Director for the 2017 season. As part of his roles and responsibilities, Dan managed and administered LTYC Club Racing operations in coordination with myself, Debi and Jack. Dan was the designated PRO for Club Racing and worked with our volunteers to schedule RC personnel. His responsibilities encompassed One Design Fleet Racing (Saturdays and some Sundays), Tuesday Night One Design and PHRF Racing, LTYC Women's Regatta, Beaver Island Race, and he assisted with the LTYC Regatta. We all know that RC work can be a thankless job, so I want to take this opportunity to thank Dan and all our volunteers; Terry Taylor-Farquharson, Gretchen Dorian, Larry Smith, Beth Varner, Beth Warner, Sandy Thompson, and Peter Maxwell. I

think things went smoothly this summer and the quality of racing was great. There is always room for improvement so please contact me if you have suggestions or concerns.

The Sailing Committee will be meeting during the winter months to review this year's racing and start planning for next year's events. We are always looking for more volunteers to help run races, please contact me if you're interested in working with the race committee.

LTYC will host the 2018 J/105 North American Championships! The LTYC Board and J/105 fleet are working closely with the Chicago Yacht Club to make it possible for J/105 boats to race the Chicago Mac and then sail to Harbor Springs for the NA Championships over the Ugotta Regatta weekend. This exciting combination of off-shore distance racing and windward/leeward buoy racing is sure to bring sailors from around the Great Lakes and across the country to Little

Traverse Bay next summer. There will also be a "Junior" award for the boats with 50% or more of their crew 21 or under. You can sign up for NA news and register to race on the LTYC J/105 web page.

The J/105 fleet will kick off the summer the week before the 4th of July with a three-day J/World racing clinic, led by Patrick Farrell, followed by two-days of racing. In addition, there will be one-design weekend racing throughout the summer, Tuesday night racing, and the ever-fun Beaver Island Race.

The family-oriented and fast-growing J/70 fleet had a spectacular Summer 2017, highlighted by the expansion of our local fleet by three boats, as well as welcoming two other LTYC families with J/70s for an extended part of the season. Our fleet became even more competitive this year, with four different winners among our six local series, and eight teams reaching the podium in at least one series this summer. Fantastic racing!

The J/70s raced more than 40 races together this summer—as a one design fleet on Tuesday evenings, a summer-long Saturday afternoon series, and a season-ending Summer Championship Series in August. In addition, our Fleet Development Day in July (ably run by Scott Sellers) featured an on-shore fleet discussion about boat setup and boat speed, as well as a series of on-the-water boat handling drills.

Once again, the J/70 fleet comprised the largest and most competitive fleet (20 boats) in the 2017 LTYC UGotta Regatta, including multiple world and national champions. LTYC member Rich Lehmann and the Wind Czar team took home a solid win in an extremely talented fleet. LTYC member Scott Sellers on Tres Burritos won the Corinthian (Amateur) scoring division.

In addition to our great racing, the Harbor Springs J/70 fleet is extremely proud of our family-oriented focus, with many boats in the fleet crewed by family teams. It's also the norm to have junior sailors on virtually all the J/70s racing. Our open fleet culture—welcoming, friendly, and learning-oriented—makes the J/70 fleet a perfect way to experience the sport. We've already expanded by one for Summer 2018— longtime LTYC members Mike and Mary Lee Duff have recently bought a J/70—and we expect to continue to add to our fleet.

And even though sailing is done for the winter in Little Traverse Bay, the Harbor Springs J/70 fleet is still actively competing, with fleet members participating this off-season in: the San Francisco Bay Big Boat Series, the Davis Island Series in Tampa, Florida, the J/70 Midwinters in Miami, Charleston Race Week, and the Annapolis NOOD.

One exciting bit of news is that the Harbor Springs J/70 Fleet has been notified that LTYC has been selected as the venue for the 2019 Corinthian North American Championships. Taking place August 8-11, 2019, the Corinthian NAs is the world's top all-amateur J/70 event, and we expect to welcome about 50 teams of the best sailors in the world to our beautiful waters. You'll be hearing much more about the planning for the this spectacular event in future months, so stay tuned.

The J/70 is one of the most successful one design classes in history, with well over 1500 sailing worldwide, and fleets at major regattas routinely numbering more than 80 boats (the recent World Championship in Puerto Cervo, Italy, featured 165 entrants!). The combination of fast, fun, family-friendly racing, as well as affordability, simplicity, and trailerability brings new possibilities for racing at LTYC (and beyond). Come sail with us next summer—our proud J/70 owners will be glad to bring you along on a race or just show off their boats! Just before the newsletter deadline, it was announced that Alerion Yachts escaped the harrowing bankruptcy of its previous owner US Watercraft and will carry on under a new owner, Peter Johnstone, a veteran of the marine industry who brings a wealth of knowledge and passion to the brand. Great news for the future of our local fleet!

The LTYC Alerion 2017 Race season is now in the books, and looking back, 2017 has to be one of the best ever. A quick calculation shows that the Alerion fleet finished close to 40(!) races from late May to mid September.

The season was chock full of short, quick windward/leeward races generally with nice breeze (frequently above 15 knots) and there were days we definitely saw some bigger sea states...overall quite a changeup from 2016, when we had several race abandonments due to high winds or just the opposite...the breeze went to bed just after the start.

For the Alerions, the summer started with the Tuesday Spring series that had eight boats racing four nights, in cool air and cool water temps. By the time the Tuesday Summer Series began, the Alerions were in full race mode with 10 boats on the line in the very competitive series that got in eight races. The Summer Saturday afternoon series had just six boats on the line, but completed more races, at 10, and the mid-day racing out on the bay was absolutely terrific. For the 2017 Ugotta Regatta, we had seven Alerions out there hanging with all the other boats and got nine races in over three days of sailing including a funky easterly breeze on the first day.

In August, the Alerion championships featured two days of very competitive sailing, and was followed closely by what has to be one of the best Tuesday Fall sailing series ever in Harbor Springs. With nine Alerions crossing the start line at some point in the series, five nights with races completed, and a first place tie that had to be broken by going four deep, the fleet remained out in full force to the bitter end of the season, which actually had some really nice mild temps but decent breeze.

As a final wrap, the Alerion owners would like to say a sincere thanks to Fleet Captain Bud Suidera who was at the helm for the past four years, and did a great job with the fleet. Thanks Bud! In the interim, until the spring fleet meeting, Tina Ludington has volunteered to handle the correspondence.

ittle Traverse Sailors' 56th summer of building lifelong sailors at LTYC was a great success. In our jam-packed nine-weeks of programming in 2017, LTS helped more than 350 kids learn and grow in our Learn to Sail Program, welcomed 20 talented and dedicated teen sailors to the expanded LTS Race Team, and continued our popular Adult Learn to Sail program on Thursday evenings in the Harbor.

Other major milestones included:

- Continued expansion of our scholarship program. Thanks to the generosity of LTYC members, we are able to support those with a passion for sailing regardless of their financial situation;
- Ongoing implementation of our fleet replacement program, with three new 420s and a new 17ft RIB coach boat joining our fleet this year;
- The introduction of a three-tiered fleet system and redeveloped teaching curriculum for our Learn-to-Sail program, dramatically increasing the amount of time spent on the water and accelerating learning (and fun!);
- The successful running of the Dinghy Racing Series on Monday and Thursday evenings, with over 100 sailors participating in Laser and 420 racing;
- The LTS Race Team successfully campaigned the LTS J/70 in local fleet racing and the LTYC Regatta, winning several races and reaching the podium in the LTYC J/70 Saturday Series;
- Hosting the 1st Annual Teddy Brown Memorial Youth Regatta in August, with more than 80 participants from 8 to 18 enjoying a great afternoon of racing and a BBQ behind the LTYC Clubhouse sponsored by Hilde Bonesteel and the LTYC.

A big thanks is due to the outstanding 2017 staff at Little Traverse Sailors, especially Meade Maxwell (Director of Learn to Sail Programs), Fred Sprunger (Executive Director), and Dan Thompson (Director of Racing Programs) for their tireless work both on and off the water. We are excited to announce that all three will return in these roles in Summer 2018!

Financially, Little Traverse Sailors ended the Fiscal Year 2017 in very sound financial condition. Revenues were steady, and we were operationally slightly cash flow positive. As a small 501C(3) nonprofit educational organization, LTS relies heavily on the generosity of LTYC members, local businesses, and parent volunteers to run our programs.

his past summer, I had the opportunity to race in the inaugural J70 Youth Champs with three of Harbor Springs finest young sailors: Franny Schulte, Preston Carey and Robert Duff. The four of us began practicing in early June for our qualifier, the Chicago NOOD, which we attended the following weekend. Chicago served up a variety of conditions, with Friday bringing steady winds from the North at 7-10 knots. Saturday warmed up, with the forecasted southwesterly coming in strong at 20-25 knots sustained, sliding right in the frequent, warm puffs. With consistent finishes on a lighter Sunday, we placed 9th of 20 after seven races, ahead of our Chicago Yacht Club youth rivals. This qualified us for the championship held last August in Newport.

Sail Newport hosted the event, with racing held just north of Fort Adams State Park. Conditions were unfavorable every day, however, the race committee managed to run three days of challenging racing. Finance

I would like to thank Bill McKinley for his years of hard work and dedication to the club. I have big shoes to fill! This report is brief since I officially took over the position only a few weeks ago. However, we have made some large strides since I started. We have the cloud-based accounting software purchased & running: QuickBooks Pro. The program will enable us to create robust reports for future planning.

Additionally, the program allows me to monitor the club's financials when I am at my office in Chicago (wishing I was in Harbor!).

The club had a solid year financially in 2017. After a review of the financials, the food and beverage was the only part of the club that had a net loss. Much of that loss was due to drink cards paid for in previous years turned in for a credit to club accounts. We expect those losses to subside in 2018, however, there is concern that the bar is not creating enough revenue and will need a renovation in the coming years. We are discussing options and will be communicating future plans as they develop. I am recommending to the board that we change the membership dues according to a standard cost of living adjustment. Labor, food, and beverages have gotten more expensive. We would like to avoid these small changes every year and instead simply do them every two to three years.

Waterfront

The Waterfront Committee's Strategic Objective is to maximize utilization of LTYC waterfront to support sailing activities of LTYC and Little Traverse Sailors, and improve access to the water for member enjoyment.

The committee has been following a strategic plan created in 2016. This year's projects were installing pressurized water lines on the main dock and replacing the lawn irrigation pump.

The old and noisy pump could only supply lake water when the lawn sprinklers were also running, and there was only a single outlet at the base of the dock. A new and quiet pressure controlled booster pump now pulls water from the lake and supplies it on demand, 24 hours per day, to either the sprinklers or the dock waterlines. Three faucets are spaced along the dock to allow easy hose access to the dingy fleet, RIBs, and Edith I.

Future projects are to add to the floating dock along the seawall, improve traffic flow for launching, and evaluate the remaining life of the main dock and its maintenance and repair needs. LTYC member Barbara Dau and her partner Bart English have offered to organize an LTYC "flotilla" to cruise the North Channel, modeled on a New York Yacht Club "Cruise in Company" trip they took in June 2014. LTYC participants could bring their own yachts or charter a power or sailing vessel from Canadian Yacht Charters, an excellent yacht chartering and marina facility located in Gore Bay, Manitoulin Island, Ontario, Canada. The week-long event would commence with a group dinner in Gore Bay. Dark and Stormy Crumble

ACTIVE TIME: 35 minutes TOTAL TIME: 1 3/4 hours SERVES: 4-6

For assembly:

Melted coconut oil, for greasing baking dish Zest of one lime

For the crumble topping:

3/4 cups whole wheat pastry flour

1/2 cup rolled oats

1/2 cup natural cane sugar

Scant 1/2 teaspoon fine sea salt

1/4 cup finely diced crystallized ginger

1/3 cup melted coconut oil

For the filling:

1 (2-inch) piece ginger, finely grated

2 teaspoons all-natural cornstarch

1/4 cup natural cane, muscovado or brown sugar

12 ounces (4-5 cups) seasonal soft fruit such as fresh quartered figs or mixed berries

1/4 cup dark rum

1/8 teaspoon Angostura bitters

- 1. Set rack in middle of oven and heat to 375 degrees. Oil an 8-inch square baking dish and sprinkle in lime zest.
- 2. *Make crumble:* In a medium bowl, mix flour, oats, sugar, salt and crystallized ginger until thoroughly combined. Use a fork to stir in melted coconut oil. Divide mixture into thirds and use your hands to form three patties. Place patties in a large bowl, separated with layers of wax paper. Freeze at least 10 pit minutes or until ready to bake.
- 3. *Make filling*: Place ginger in a strainer and press to expel liquid. Discard solids. You should have 2-3 teaspoons liquid.
- 4. In a large bowl, whisk together cornstarch and sugar. Add fruit and gently toss until evenly coated. Let sit for 3 minutes. Add rum, ginger juice, and bitters, and toss again. Transfer filling to prepared baking dish. Remove crumble from freezer and break apart over filling, making sure you have both big and small pieces.
- 5. Bake until topping is deeply golden and fruit juices have thickened and are vigorously bubbling, 35-40 minutes. Let cool slightly, 30 minutes. Serve with vegan vanilla or coconut ice cream or vegan whipped cream of your choice. -Adapted from Heidi Swanson of 707 Cookbooks and Quitokeeto
